Acting and Musical Theater Admission

Overview:

- Many Different Programs
 - o BFA: Spend about 75% of time in art discipline (audition-based)
 - o BA: More traditional college, but can be focused (sometimes audition)
 - Conservatories, conservatories within universities, strong programs within more traditional colleges
- Musical Theater vs. Acting
 - Most BFA/specialized programs require you to specify which department (MT or Acting) you are applying to
 - Some allow you to audition for both (or audition for MT and still be considered for Acting), but every school is different

Things to Consider:

- Most conservatory-style programs are more competitive than the Ivies
 - o 1% at Julliard, 2% at Carnegie Mellon, 15% at NYU
 - Apply to a range of schools and also non-audition school
- Many schools have early deadlines and/or pre-screenings
 - o Some require you to apply to the college and the program
 - This requires a lot more organization to keep track
 - o Some schools do an academic review before allowing for an audition
- Do your research! Consider things like:
 - o Structure and size of program
 - How rigid is the program?
 - What is their primary emphasis within acting and MT?
 - Classical, Dance, Singing, Experimental, etc.
 - What are the opportunities for performance
 - Some don't allow students to audition right away
 - o What are the opportunities for study abroad (especially summer)
 - o Connections to the industry?
 - Do they have a showcase? Does this matter?
 - O Where are the alumni working?
 - o Can you double major or minor?
- Perhaps do a summer intensive before senior year
- Fancy headshots are not necessary a picture suffices
- A resume is helpful, but admission is pretty much all about the audition

Auditions:

Every school is different - ALWAYS check requirements

- Acting
 - o Usually, 2 contrasting monologues
 - Usually contemporary, but sometimes one classical
 - o Almost always an interview component at the end
- Musical Theater

(Auditions cont.)

- O Usually, 2 contrasting songs, one up-tempo and one ballad
- o Usually, 2 contrasting monologues
 - Typically contemporary, but sometimes 2 classical
- Usually a movement/dance component
- o Sometimes a sight reading and/or piano component
- Almost always an interview component at the end
- General Things to Keep in Mind
 - O Pay close attention to requirements and expectations
 - Time limits
 - Monologue and song choices and recommendations
 - Additional supplements to bring (recs, picture, resume)
 - Try to audition on campus or at Unified Auditions if applicable, and always in person (versus video)
 - Have more in your arsenal
 - Prepare another song and monologue
 - o Dress casually, but nicely
 - Be ready to move
 - Don't test out a new outfit on that day
 - Select pieces that are appropriate to you
 - Shy away from playing someone much older or younger
 - Shy away from accents (unless you are very proficient)
 - Work with a teacher if possible
